

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<u>Application and Reasoning</u> Recognising the Future Perfect Form

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<u>Developing</u>

1a. Sentence C is the odd one out because it is the only sentence that is not written in the future perfect form.

2a. A: called, B: opened, C: reviewed
3a. Mandy is not correct because 'will have' should come before the past participle 'listened' to make this the future perfect tense.

4a. Sentence B is the odd one out because it is the only sentence that is not written in the future perfect form.
