<u>Year 5 – Spring Block 3 – Tenses – Present Perfect Form</u>

Notes and Guidance

- In Year 3, children learned to use the present perfect form of a verb. The aim of this step is to recap the present perfect form.
- The present perfect tense describes an action that is completed over an unspecified period of time in the past, or that began in the past and continues in the future. The present perfect is formed using an auxiliary verb (have/has), followed by the past participle. For example, I have fallen; She has worked here for two years.

- Is this sentence in the present perfect tense? How do you know?
- Change this sentence so that it is in the present perfect tense.
