6a. Jason's sentence is more concise. He has described the elephant's mood (furious) and strength (powerful). Alice has described its strength (powerful) and its size (huge) but all elephants are huge so this information is not useful.

7a. Various answers, for example: Despite having very little water, the unusual, solitary cactus grew slowly in the endless, lonely desert.

8a. Various answers, for example: The beautiful, startled birds flew across the dim, colourful sky, as the lady watched from below.

9a. Liam's sentence is more concise. He has described the rats' nature (timid) and taste (delicious). Amber has only described the rats' taste (tasty, delicious).

Expected

4b. Various answers, for example: The cunning cheetah sprinted through the jungle.

5b. Various answers, for example: The winding, shallow river flowed beneath the mountains.

6b. Mia's sentence is more concise. She has described the sun's temperature (sizzling) and colour (golden). Alfie has only described its colour (yellow, golden).

Greater Depth

7b. Various answers, for example: Growing longer throughout the harsh winter, the beautiful, glimmering icicles hung from the thick, leafy branches.

8b. Various answers, for example: The old, decrepit buildings crumbled onto the dirty, cracked pavement below, which endangered all those nearby.

9b. Freya's sentence is more concise. She has described the clown's behaviour (foolish) and sense of humour (amusing). Aleem has used the adjectives silly and foolish which have the same meaning.
