

Different Beliefs



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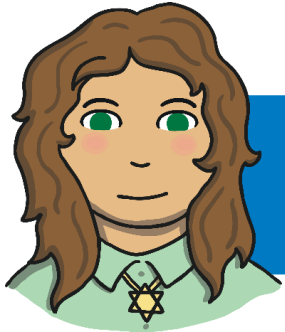
People have many different beliefs and gods that they worship.

wear a topi on their head.

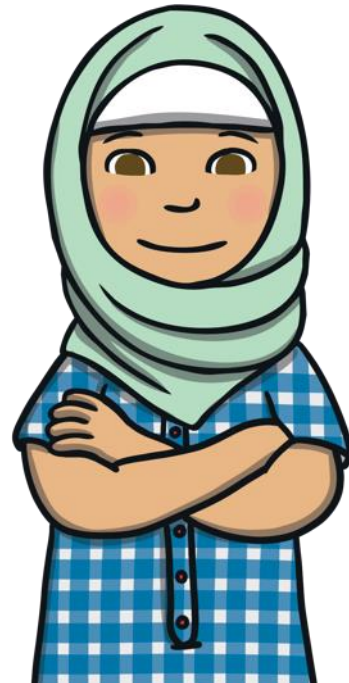


Some Buddhist boys like

A Christian girl may wear a headdress to their First Holy Communion which covers their hair.

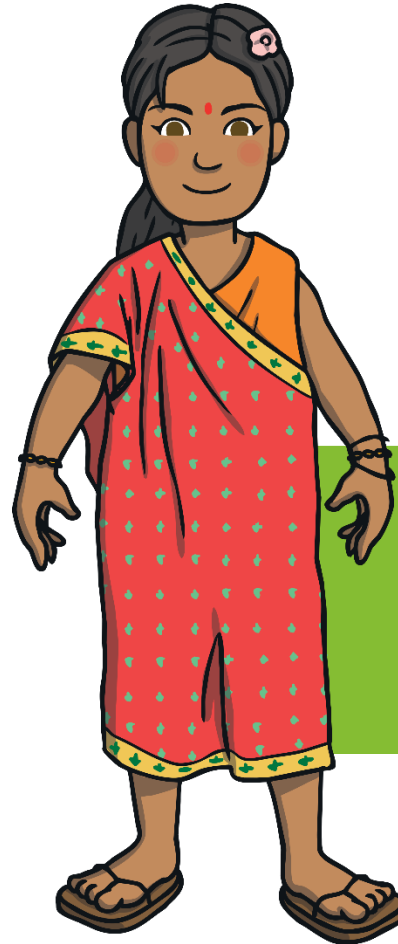


A Muslim girl may wear a hijab which covers their hair also.

Some Sikh girls wear a shalwar kameez.

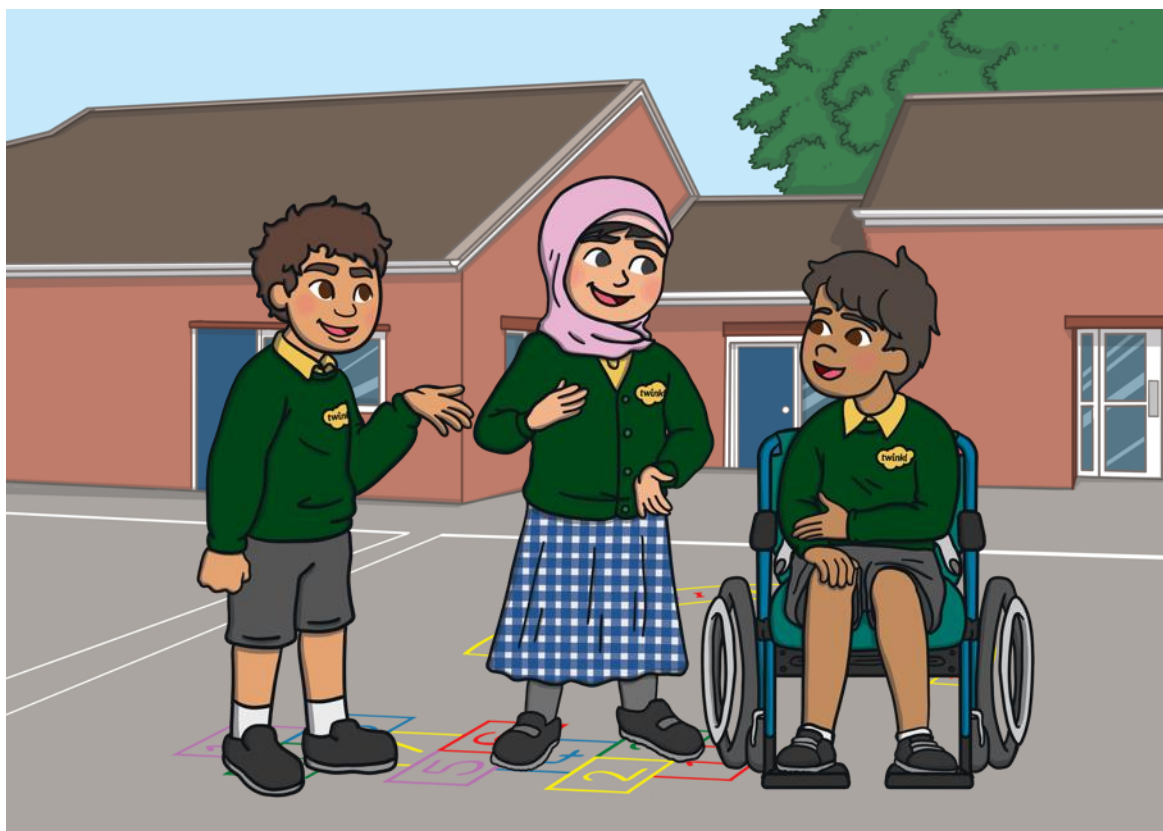


Some Hindu girls wear a sari.



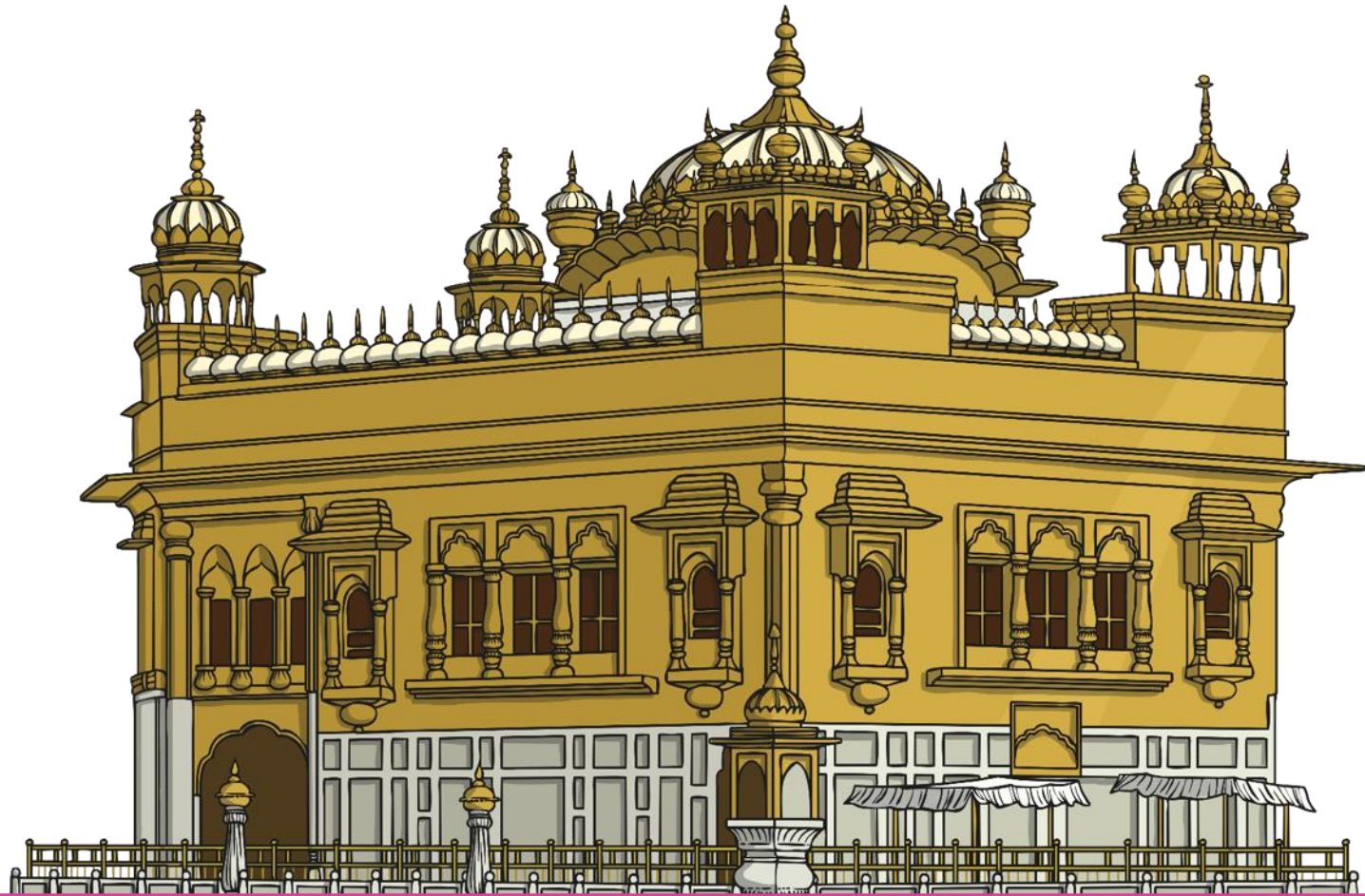


Most children wear a school uniform.





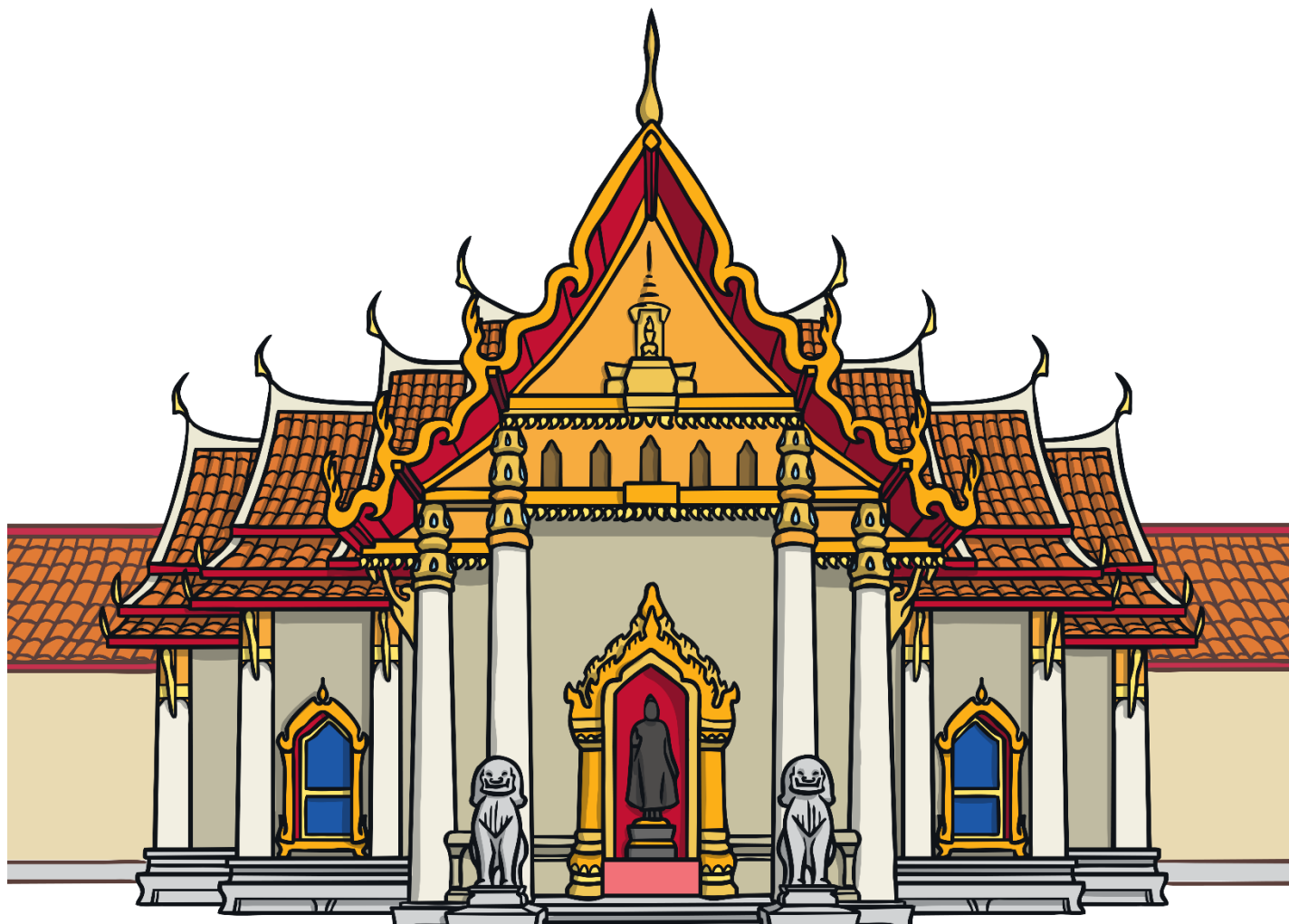
Christians worship in a church.



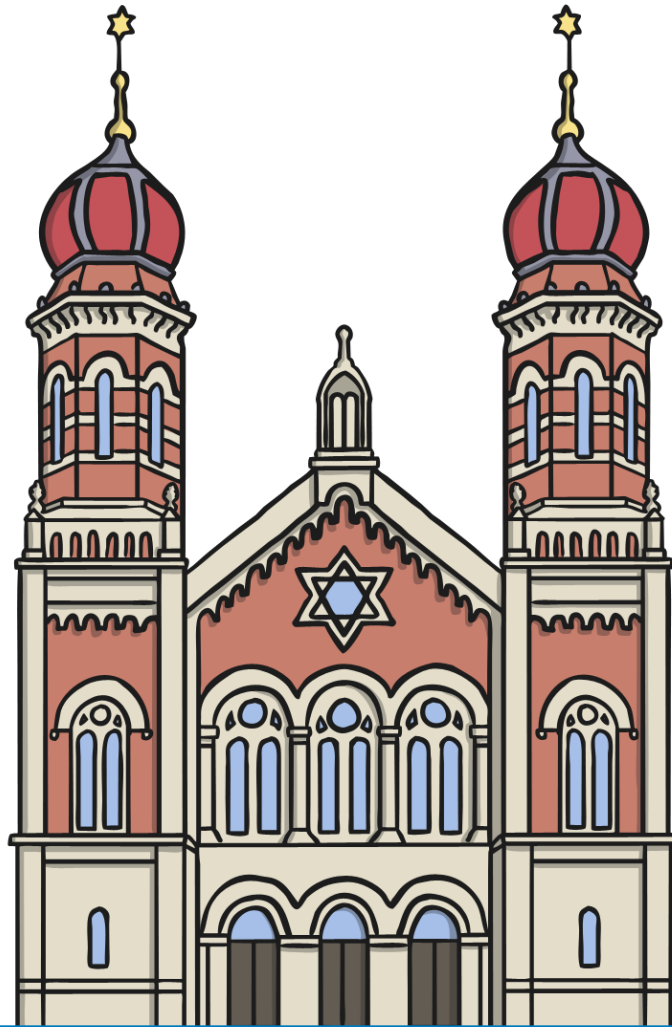
Sikhs worship at a gurdwara.

Humanists do not have a place of worship but meet to hold special talks in different places.

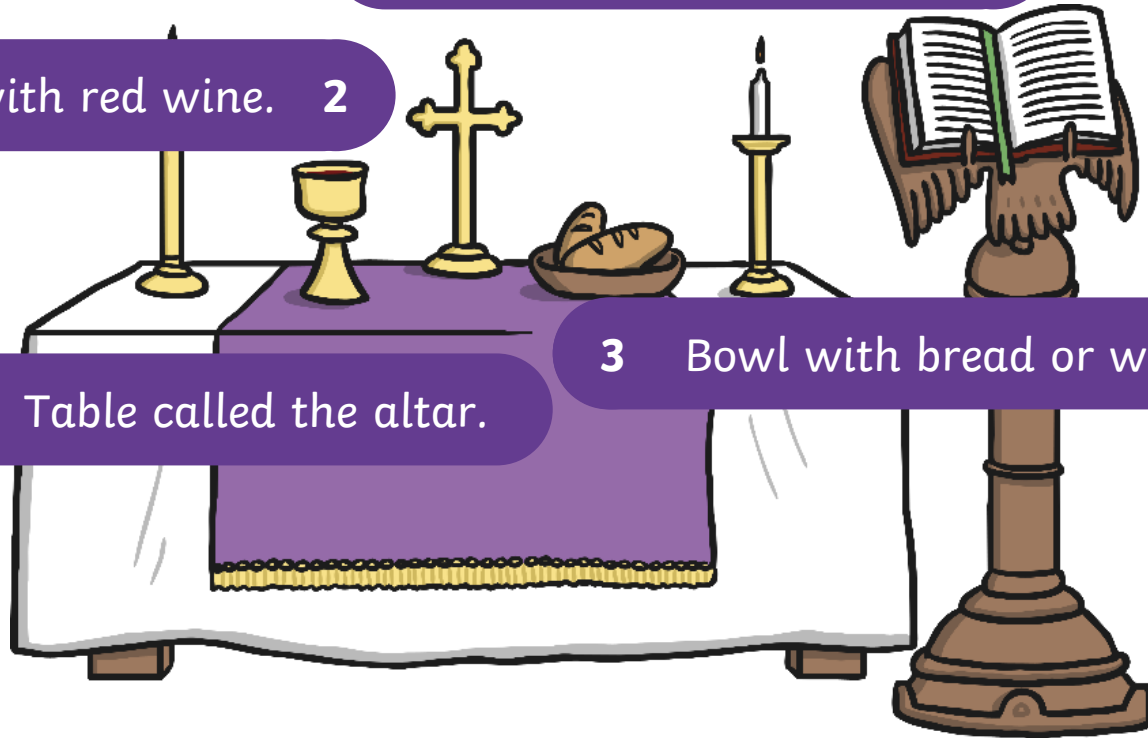

Inside a gurdwara

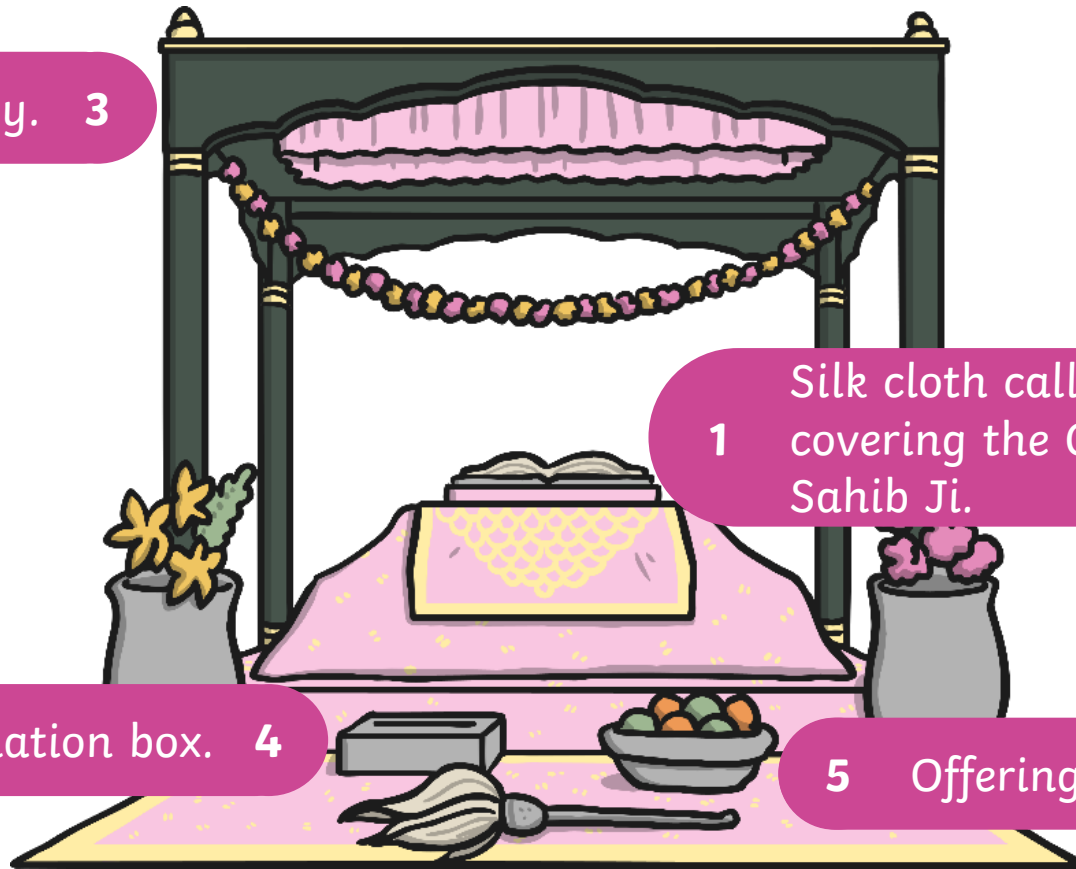
Canopy. 3

1 Silk cloth called a romala covering the Guru Granth Sahib Ji.

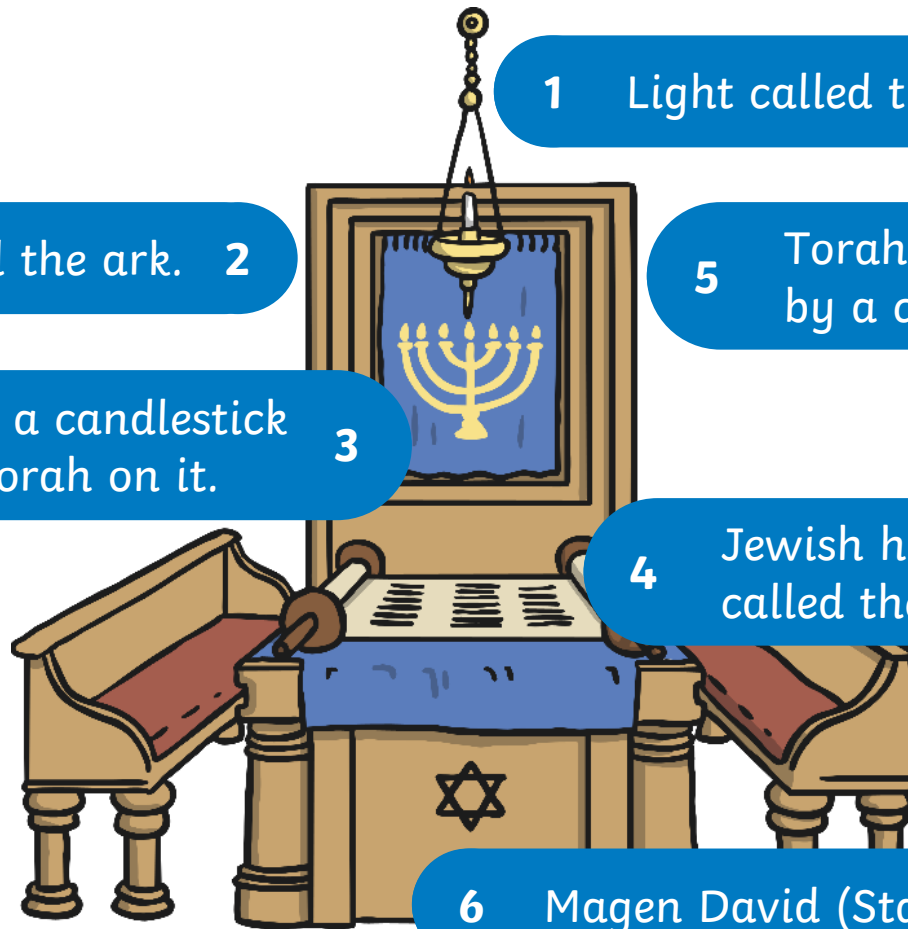
Money donation box. 4

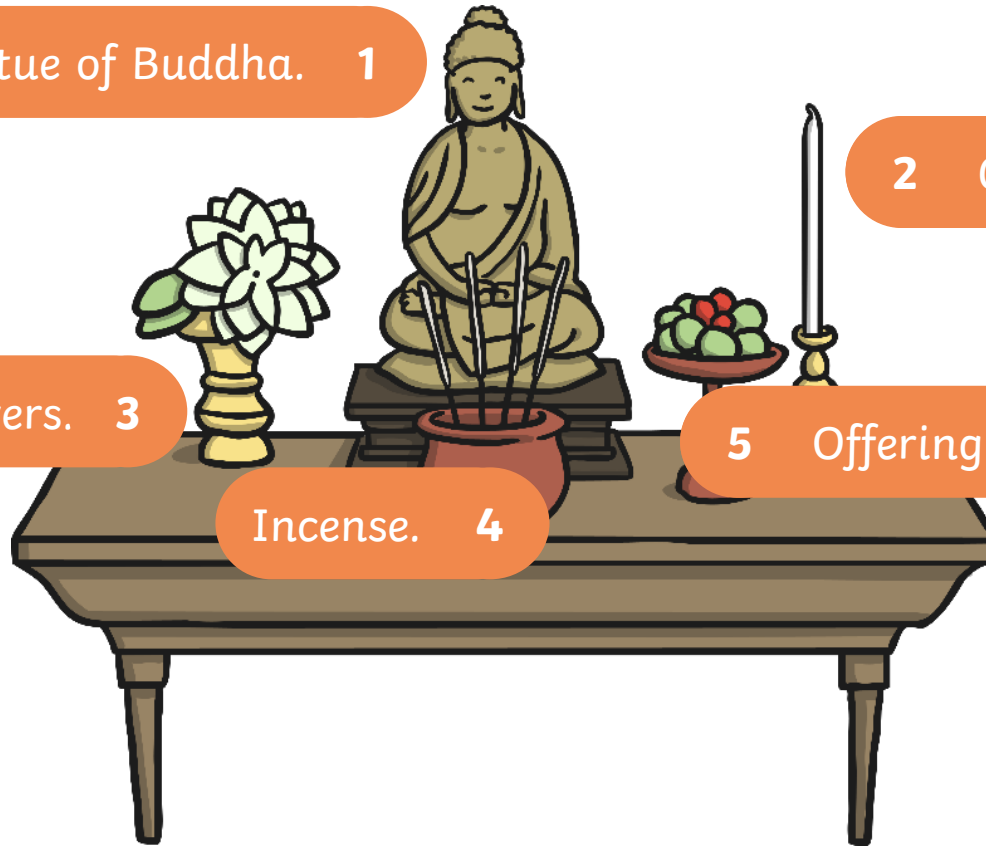

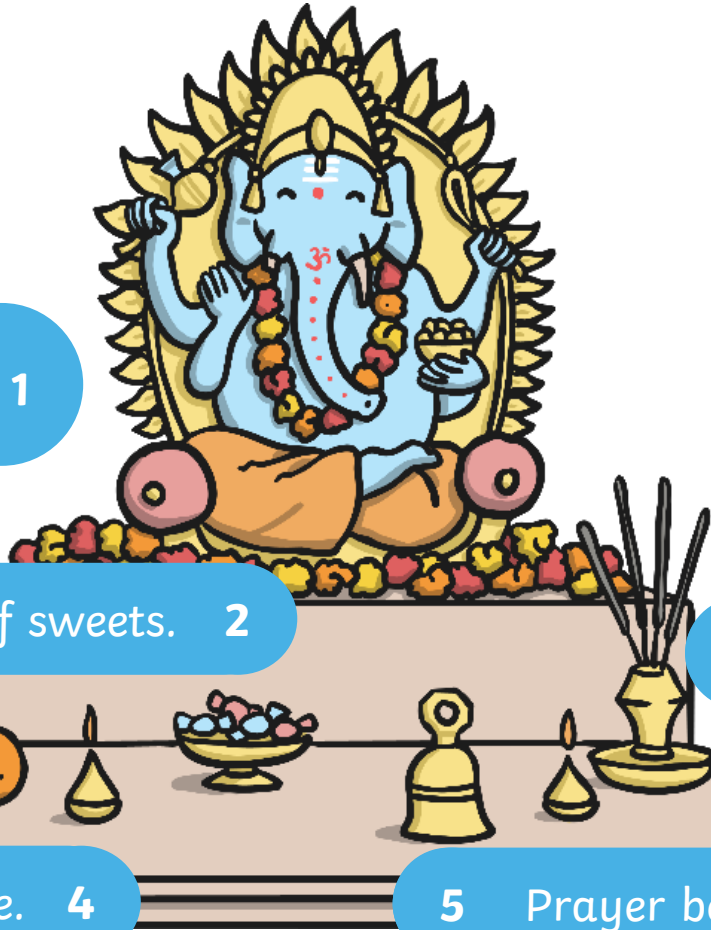
Bowl of sweets. 2

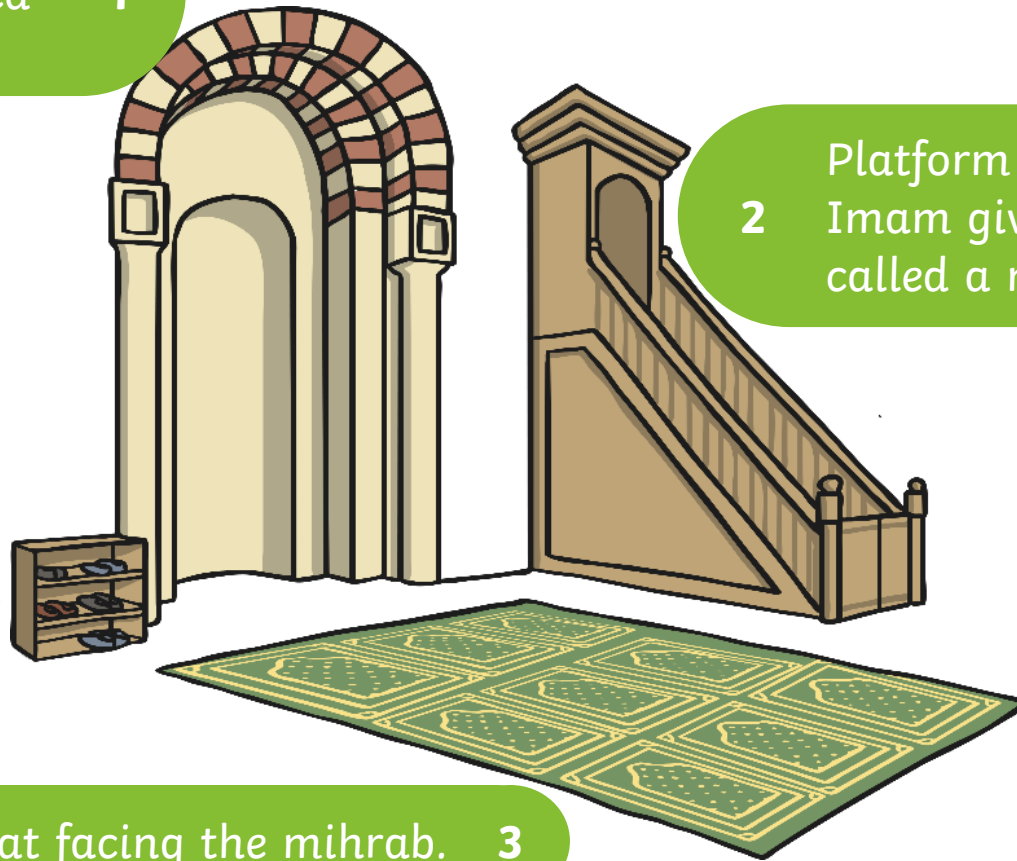
Inside a mosque

Platform where the Imam gives his talk called a minbar. 2

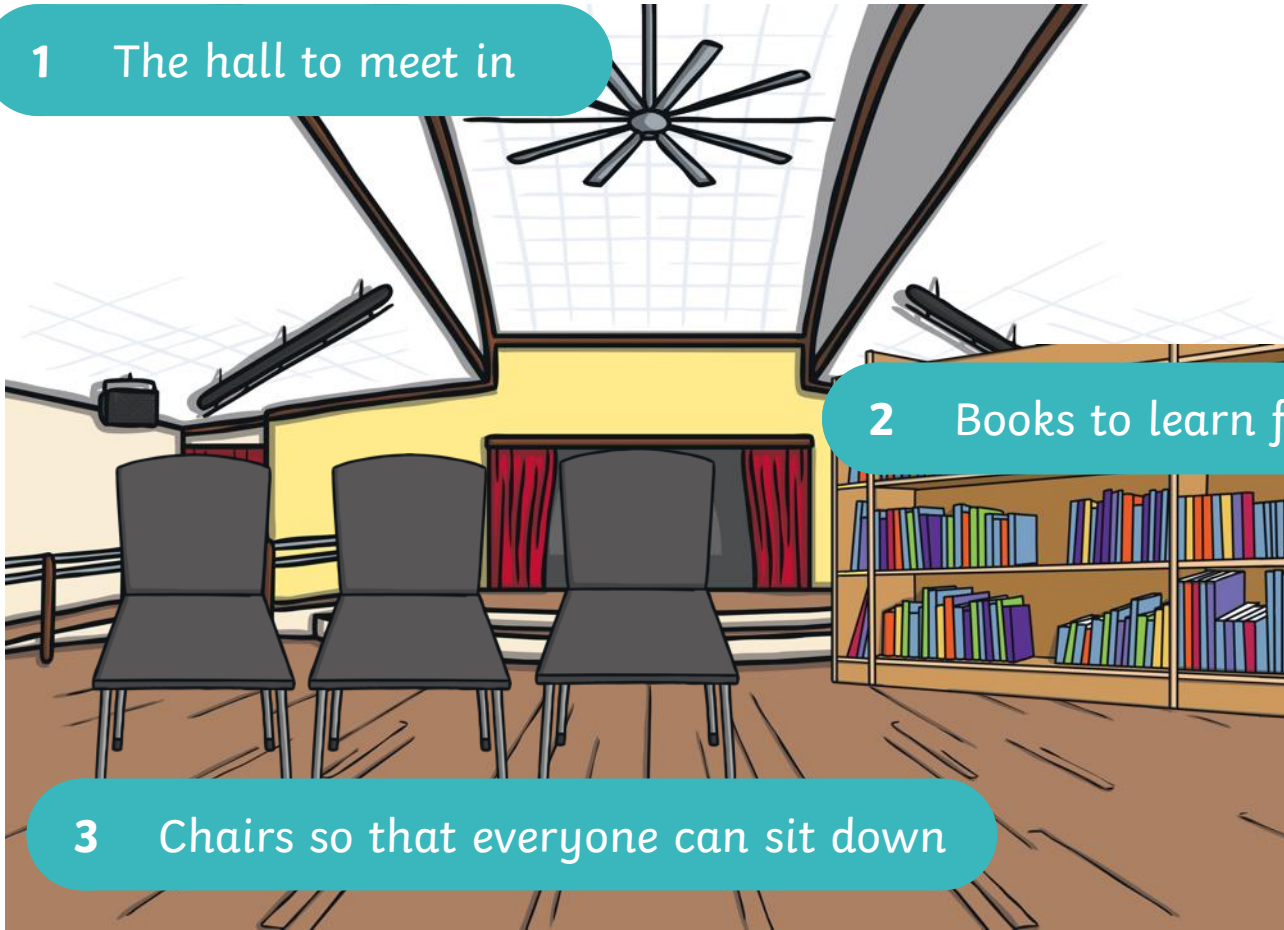
Shoe rack. 4
