Differentiation:

Developing Questions to support recognising noun phrases, with modifying adjectives, for example: 'A big, lazy dog.' Uses single clause sentences.

Expected Questions to support recognising noun phrases, with modifying adjectives and prepositional phrases, for example: 'The big, lazy dog under the tree.' Uses single and multi-clause sentences.

Greater Depth Questions to support recognising multiple noun phrases, with modifying adjectives and prepositional phrases within multi-clause sentences, for example: 'The big, lazy dog under the tree, stretched his long, muddy legs and closed his eyes for a nap.'
