Year 5 – Spring Block 3 – Tenses – Recognising Past Perfect Form

Notes and Guidance:

- Now that children have recapped the present perfect tense, they can move on to recognising the past perfect form of the verb.
- The past perfect form describes an action that has occurred in the past, before another event has happened.
 It is formed using the past participle of the verb followed by an auxiliary verb. For example, Before she opened her eyes, I had hidden in a good place.
- In this step, children should recognise the past perfect form (including its use within sentences).

Focused Questions

- What is the past perfect form?
- What would you look for when deciding if a sentence is in the past perfect form?
- Is this sentence in the past perfect form? How do you know?
